




Book Week 2022

This year we celebrated Book Week by going off timetable. Across the school we looked at the book 'Journey' by Aaron Becker with each class, from Nursery to Year 6, taking part in lots of fun and creative activities! The week started with a whole school assembly to launch the book and to look at the first few pages together. Despite there being no words in this book, the children were able to use the illustrations to draw out lots of information about the girl and how she might have been feeling.



A little girl, bored of the monotonous and lonely routine of everyday life, seeks refuge and excitement in a world created entirely by her imagination. By drawing a magical door from her bedroom wall, she finds herself transported into enthralling new lands - vividly colourful and alive with adventure. Navigating her way through glistening rivers, dramatic moats and dizzying waterfalls with a few artful strokes of her crayon, she is soon soaring above the clouds in a bright red hot-air balloon, trying to save a vibrant lilac bird which has been imprisoned. Disaster strikes when, having freed the bird, she is caught by angry guards who throw away her magical crayon. Hopeless and alone, the girl is left in a dark cage when suddenly through the sky returns the lilac bird, carrying in its beak her magical crayon. Together the two of them embark on further adventures.





Nursery

The children in Nursery used their Tales Toolkit to create their own 'Journey' adventure. The children thought of their own ideas and came up with a fantastic story!

Character: girl with the red crayon

Setting: the beach (in Mexico!)

Problem: the sea was knocking over her sandcastle!

Solution: the little girl drew a wall to block the sea

The children also created stories of their own!









Reception



The children in Reception created their own version of the story using their Tales Toolkit. The children

were inspired to write their very own stories; they did a fantastic job!



The children thought about different settings that the little girl could visit. They looked at photos of the different

locations on Google Images and even looked on Google Earth to see where in the world they are! From this the children drew their own maps to show the different places that the girl could journey to.



The children looked very closely at the illustration of the magical wood from the story. They noticed lots of trees.

fairy lights, lanterns, and dull colours! The children went for a walk to the woods and used an iPad



to take photos. They paid close attention to the different shades of green and brown that they saw which later inspired some artwork!







The children also made their own paper lanterns which they took to hang on the trees outside!









Year I

Year I started the week by going on their very own journey through the magic red door and into our magical woodlands. The children collected natural objects from the wood which they used to create sensory maps of their journey.





The children also created their own mythical creatures that could live in the woods, they turned their creatures into masks, which was lots of fun! The children then created a tree using wire to create the structure, clay to create the trunk, roots and branches, and tissue paper to create the leaves.










The children have taken part in lots of book related activities after looking at the book, 'Journey'. They created acrostic poems, designed their own imaginary settings, and explored the continents too!

In Year 3 the children looked closely at the illustrations in order to better understand the character. They created a brilliant word-bank about the girl and then made their

own pen portraits of her, with some super ideas of what her name was, how old she was, where she lived and her favourite hobbies! The children also designed and made their own magic door and wrote a diary entry from the girl's point of view.





They then worked in teams to create a bridge to help the girl cross over to the city. The children created freeze frames from the book, and they

guessed which scene was being recreated. After that the children used their imaginations to design their own fictional world map and wrote a mini book about their new world.





They spent a day researching famous explorers and designed their own exploration vehicle.







The children designed and made vehicles inspired by the multiple modes of transport found in the book. The children especially enjoyed the crash test carried out by Mr Philo on the roof! Carrying on with the vehicle theme, the children explored modes of transport around cities and created a poem for these.

The children also wrote a diary entry form the perspective of the girl exploring the unusual city found at the beginning of the book. The children loved the book so much that they began to explore the next book in the series 'Quest' and made predictions about the story. They used their imagination to create worlds for the characters to explore in the next story and painted these behind an enchanted door with watercolours in the same style as the illustrations in the book.















Book Week in Year 5 was all about the children letting their imagination take them on a journey. The children used different art techniques to produce amazing silhouette skies while also publishing their own poems about their imaginations. In maths the children learnt about 3D nets which then allowed them to plan and assemble their own 3D cars using 'Purple Mash.'











This week, Year 6 have written descriptive passages describing air travel in the book. They explored the use of expanded noun phrases and the five senses which they included in their work. Later in the week, they had creative freedom in generating their own versions of 'Journey.' They were given the opportunity to type, write or draw their own story using the book as inspiration. Finally, they created maps to show the fictional settings and the story line of Journey that are evident in the book.
